Welcome!

Welcome to Sussex! Our Kingswood University 55-acre campus is located between 26 Western Street and 98 Summit Avenue, Sussex, New Brunswick. See the map of campus on page .

Finding and securing a place to live is an important step to adjusting to life in Canada. The following information can help you through this process and help you make the best decision for your housing needs. Please note that Kingswood University does not arrange for accommodation. Students are responsible for applying for their own housing.

Getting Settled Checklist

The following is a guided checklist to aid in your transition as a Crandall graduate student living at the Kingswood campus.

Upon Arriving at your residence:

- Photocopy your study permit and passport for safe keeping
- Take note of when your study permit and passport expire
- Prepare a budget
- Shop for household items
- Understand the transportation options and area map of Sussex

If you are living off-campus:

- Arrange for electric/gas/water hook-up
- Buy tenant insurance for your new residence
- Buy groceries
- Get a landline/internet/television service (optional)

Upon arriving for orientation:

- Attend new student orientation
- Contact the Registrar's office to have your study permit verified (original document is required)
- Meet with your academic advisor or dean
- Make note of the important dates listed in this guidebook and in your class syllabi
- Familiarize yourself with the campus and take note of your class locations
- Learn how to use the library system
- Visit the Student Success Centre and learn about offerings

During the first week:

- Apply for your New Brunswick Medicare card (see page)

- Apply for a Social Insurance Number (SIN) - this will allow you to apply for work (see page)
- Open a bank account (see page)
- Get a cell phone or sim card (optional) (see page)

And:

- Read this International Student Guidebook
- Make a study plan
- Buy necessary winter clothing (when appropriate)

On-Campus Housing

Kingswood currently provides four residence buildings for student housing on campus.

- Joan Phillippe House is a 60-bed women's residence, providing for double (bunk beds) or single room occupancy. Each pod of six residents has a shared bathroom and shower, and small lounge area.
- Ingersoll House is a 57 bed men's residence, providing for double (bunk beds) or single room occupancy. Each floor has shared bathroom and shower facilities for residents.
- Tom Phillippe has 20 beds for women on one wing and 20 beds for men on the opposite wing. All rooms are double occupancy, and each room has its own bathroom and shower.
- At our Townhouse Apartments there are eight two-bedroom apartments (shared by four single students in double occupancy rooms) and eight three-bedroom apartments (shared by up to six single students in double occupancy) that include kitchen and laundry appliances. Half of these apartments are furnished. Availability is very limited.

All campus housing costs include utilities of heat, lights, water, and WIFI internet service. Resident needs, management issues, and community life are supported through the Campus Life office with the support of campus Resident Directors and Resident Assistants.

Married students, common-law, or those students in romantic relationships who are looking for living space to share together with their spouse, partner or dependents should seek accommodations off campus.

Pets are not permitted in campus housing, so pet owners should seek off-campus housing options.

Meal service is provided in the Greg Mann Dining Commons (see page). All students living in campus residences listed above must choose a 14- or 21-meal plan for dining at the Dining Commons. Cooking is not permitted in the residence rooms or lounges.

International student applications for housing at Kingswood are processed only after students have received their study visa and a verification of enrolment from Crandall University. Please note that housing applications are only accepted at certain times of the year.

Please note that your permanent or temporary accommodation must be arranged prior to arrival, which means that you have received confirmation that your housing is secured.

There are a few places one can rent an apartment in Sussex, if you are looking on your own. It is important to keep in mind, Sussex is a small town. There is no public transportation system (subway or bus line) in Sussex. There are a few taxis, but this can be expensive. First, look for apartment rentals located within walking distance of campus. The Campus Life Office at Kingswood University may be able to assist you with a list of landlords who provide rental services in the Sussex area.

Note: When living off campus, rent cost does not necessarily include utilities (electricity, heat, water, internet). Make sure to check with your landlord before signing a lease. If utilities are not included, you are responsible for the initial hookup fees and will be required to pay an amount monthly depending on how much you use.

Setting up Internet for Off-Campus Residence

When setting up your home internet, you may need to rent or buy a modem from the internet provider and there may be a hookup fee to set up. Try asking the provider if there is a university student discount before signing with them. Internet fees are often billed monthly.

Meals at Kingswood campus are served at the Greg Mann Dining Commons in Stairs Hall at 80 Summit Avenue.

Off-Campus students are welcome to purchase a meal for the dining room. - January 1st policy renewal – December 31st deadline

Climate in Sussex

The Sussex climate is characterized by four distinct seasons, with frequent temperature changes throughout the day. For example, if you first arrive in May, some warm spring days you may be comfortable in shorts, t-shirts and sandals as it can be warm during the day. Evenings cool off fairly quickly. Summers get hot in July and August. By late October, you will need a winter jacket, mittens/gloves, hat, warm socks and a good pair of winter boots. Winters in Sussex are cold and snowy (typically beginning in late November extending through March). Wearing layers of clothes is helpful for adjusting to the indoor and outdoor temperatures.

The campus buildings are kept at 20°C to 22 °C (70 Fahrenheit) year-round.

Fall (September to November) is one of the most beautiful times to be in Canada. As the seasons change, the leaves on the trees become vibrant and colourful. Every October, at Kingswood University, faculty, staff and students enjoy time in nature enjoying the beauty of our area.

Winter (November/December to March/April) is cold with temperatures usually around -10°C but dropping as low as -30 °C to -40°C with the windchill. We usually see a number of snowstorms through the winter and have lots of snow and ice. It is important that you wear clothing that is appropriate to the weather, especially in winter. We recommend that you purchase your outdoor winter clothing in Canada since these are manufactured to meet Canadian weather standards. You should budget approximately \$200 to \$300 CAD to purchase winter clothing. For winter clothing you will need:

- Hat or toque that covers your ears
- Mittens and gloves
- Scarf
- Winter coat
- Snow pants (if you are outside for a long period e.g.: walking, playing winter sports, etc.)
- Thick socks
- Winter boots (it is best to get boots that go above your ankle so snow doesn't get in your boots while walking)

In the event of a snow day closures or cancellations, Kingswood university will notify students and post notices on Kingswood social media pages.

Spring (March/April and May) brings moderate temperatures and a lot of rainfall. It usually requires a lighter jacket with a hood. Waterproof shoes or boots are very helpful during this season.

Summer (June to September) is a stark contrast to the winters in Sussex. It can be hot, with periods of high humidity and with temperatures ranging from 20°C to 35 °C. Occasionally (usually starting late August) you will need a sweater or light jacket to pull over a t-shirt in the evenings.

Time Zone

Sussex is on Atlantic Standard Time (AST) and we use a Daylights Savings plan. This means that on the first Sunday of November clocks adjust one hour backwards and on the second Sunday in March clocks are adjusted one hour forward. Here is a phrase to help you remember: "*Spring Forward – Fall Back*". This term is meant to trigger your memory to change your clocks!

Postage and Mail

The national post office in Canada is Canada Post but there are also other forms of delivery such as Fedex. You can mail letters and packages with valid shipping information by visiting the nearest Canada Post Office. There are two Canada Post Offices in Sussex - Shoppers Drug Mart, 201 Main Street, and 48 Maple Avenue.

Mail should be addressed in the following order:

Full Name *or* Business Name
Apartment number, Street Number Street Name
City *or* Town, Province
Postal Code

Please note students can only receive incoming mail at Kingswood campus if living on campus in one of the residence buildings.

Garbage System

Sorting your garbage is a common practice in Canada to help the environment. Organic material, bottles, and other recyclable materials are sorted separately from other waste. In Sussex, we have three different coloured garbage bags to help with sorting waste. For more information about garbage sorting and collection, see <https://www.eco360.ca/residential-program>.

Shopping

Drivers License

You must have a valid driver's license to operate a motor vehicle while in Canada. To get a license in Canada, contact Service New Brunswick (<https://www2.snb.ca/>).

“Students who move to New Brunswick do not need to exchange their licence while in school, but as soon as they take up permanent residence or become gainfully employed, they must exchange their licence.”

Another option is to obtain an international driver’s license using your license from your home country; this would provide you the opportunity to rent a vehicle while in Canada.

Banking

Opening a student bank account in Canada is a free and simple process. There are several banks close to the University. Make sure you find out what account is best suited to your needs.

To open an account, you will need to have personal identification (bring your passport and Crandall student ID card). To activate this account, you will need to deposit a small amount of money. After opening the account, you will receive a bank debit card (in the mail) that will allow you to withdraw money at automated bank teller machines and will be accepted at stores to pay for your purchases.

Please note that it can be difficult for an international student to obtain a credit card. We recommend that you obtain a credit card in your home country if you think you will need one during your time in Canada (Visa and Mastercard are most common).

Laws

Liquor and Smoking Laws:

The legal drinking and smoking age in New Brunswick is 19 years. It is unlawful to consume alcoholic beverages or smoke in public places or on the Kingswood University Campus.

*Kingswood campus and Crandall University Students and their guests are **NOT ALLOWED** to possess, consume, or distribute alcoholic beverages, tobacco, marijuana, or illicit drugs on Kingswood or Crandall property.*

Driving Laws

General driving rules, laws, and regulations in Canada:

- Vehicles drive on the right-hand side of the road.
- Pass others on the left-hand side of the road.
- Always give way to pedestrians on pedestrian crossings.
- All occupants must wear a seatbelt.
- Mobile phones are not permitted while driving, with the exception of a hands-free system.
- Always use indicator lights when turning
- Radar detectors are prohibited

Drivers are to carry at all times while driving:

- A valid driver's license
- Registration documents
- Insurance documents

Driving rules are enforced by the police and should be strictly followed, if laws are broken, you would receive a fine or jail-time depending on the infraction.

Sexual Harassment

Sexual harassment means any conduct, comment, gesture, or contact of a sexual nature, whether on a one-time basis or in a continuous series of incidents that:

- Might reasonably be expected to cause offense or humiliation to any person or
- Might reasonably be perceived by an individual as placing a condition of a sexual nature on employment, grades, favor, or on an opportunity for promotion.

Examples of sexual harassment include, but are not limited to:

- unwelcome sexual advances or propositions
- direct or implied requests or expectations of sexual activity under threat, or in exchange for favors or promises of preferential treatment
- verbal abuse of a sexual nature
- staring, leering, patting, pinching, touching, sexually suggestive references to physical appearance, unnecessary familiarity or physical contact
- displays of erotic or sexually explicit posters, pictures, graffiti or other materials on computer screen savers
- sexual jokes, comments or innuendoes
- sexually suggestive behavior, offensive telephone calls or obscene gestures
- intrusive inquiries into an employee's or student's private life or sexuality
- public displays of nudity (flashing)
- pervasive animosity or extreme rudeness directed at a single sex

Applying for Medicare

Medicare is used for if you have an emergency and need to go to the hospital, or if you need to go to a walk-in clinic to see a doctor. You have insurance called Guard.Me International Emergency Insurance through Crandall that is similar to Medicare, but there is a fee (see page).

We encourage students to apply for Medicare because it is free through Service NB.

- You will need
 - Your arrival date in the province, as well as the arrival date of your dependents
 - Your passport and Study Permit,
 - An Enrollment Verification Letter (EVL) – request a copy Under Enrolment Verification Letter at <https://www.crandallu.ca/registrar/forms-and-requests/> (be sure to include a note that this is for a Medicare application).
 - PLEASE NOTE YOU WILL NOT BE ABLE TO REQUEST AN EVL UNTIL YOU HAVE PROVIDED YOUR STUDY PERMIT IN PERSON TO THE KINGSWOOD UNIVERSITY REGISTRAR'S OFFICE DURING ORIENTATION WEEK.
 - Proof of residency (You need one of the examples below, which shows your address and name):
 - Rental or Lease Agreement (must be signed by landlord & tenant)

- Letter from Kingswood University certifying that you live on campus (contact campuslife@kingswood.edu)
- Utility Bill - not older than 2 months (phone, energy, cable/satellite, water/sewer)
- Employment Confirmation - current (pay stub or letter from employer on company letterhead)
- Phone bill
- Void cheque, stamped by the bank

There is a three-month hold from your date of arrival in Canada, before Service NB will process your application, but please apply as soon as you are able.

Greetings

Canadians do not engage in long greetings or long goodbyes. Most commonly, the greeting will consist of “hello”, “hi”, or “how are you?” (not necessarily a question to be answered but a simple form of greeting). A common response is “fine, thanks.” “Bye”, or “see you later” is a typical departing expression.

Use of Names

In Canadian culture, it is appropriate to refer to someone of your same status and age, or younger, by their first name. Mr., Mrs., Miss, however, should be used to address a man or woman older than you. In University, professors should be addressed by title and last name (Professor or Dr.)

Time

Time is of great value to Canadians, and it is critical to be 'on time' for scheduled events, appointments and classes. If an appointment or class is scheduled for 10:30 am, you should plan to arrive a few minutes **early**. Canadians will consider it to be very rude if you show up late. For community and medical appointments, it is common for there to be a fee charged for being late or not showing up for your appointment.

Reduced Scent and Body Odor

In Canada, most public and community spaces have a reduced scent or scent free policies because many Canadians have reported allergic reactions to certain scents and fragrances. Mild body deodorants are okay and encouraged, however, it is important to respect the rules and policies put in place by businesses, schools, and medical facilities. Most clinics and hospitals have a scent free policy.

Please note: Kingswood campus and Crandall University have a reduced scent policy to respect those who have allergies to perfumes and fragrances.

Conversations/Questions/Directness/Politeness

Canadians tend to ask a lot of questions. In Canada, asking questions is a way of expressing interest in a person or subject such as your country or culture. In many cultures, silence is widely accepted. In Canadian culture, however, it is often regarded as uncomfortable or awkward, and in such moments, Canadians are quick to fill the gap with a comment or question. Canadians are also known for their sense of directness. Discussing ideas and opinions openly is not uncommon and Canadians can be quick to get to the point. In Canadian culture, it is considered *extremely* rude to talk while someone is talking or is giving a presentation.

Tipping

Tipping or service charges are not usually added to a bill, except for large parties or banquets. An additional 12 to 17% is normal as a gratuity. Tipping applies in all restaurants, bars/lounges, hairdressing salons, delivery people, and taxi drivers.

GST, PST, and HST

- **GST** (Goods & Service Tax) is a 5% added tax from the Federal Government of Canada. All provinces have this tax on most goods and services sold in stores and businesses.
- **PST** (Provincial Sales Tax) is an added tax from the Provincial Government where you are purchasing the product. Not all provinces have PST added to goods and services sold.
- **HST** (Harmonized Sales Tax) is a combination of federal (GST) and provincial (PST) sales taxes on goods and services. New Brunswick is one of the provinces which have HST.
- New Brunswick has 15% HST on goods and services sold from stores and businesses. That means that when you go to the grocery store, restaurant, or other entertainment services (ie. Movie theater, sports games, amusement parks, etc.) the price listed on the item is before taxes. For example, if you buy a shirt at Marks' and the price on the tag is \$25.99, when you go to the cashier to pay, 15% HST will be added to the total price of your purchase and will cost a final total of \$29.89.

Income Tax

Canadians, Permanent Residents, and Temporary Residents file income tax returns with the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) every year. International students will need to file an income tax return if they are working or studying in Canada. Employers and Schools will send out tax documents at the end of February. Office Hours & Business Days

In Canada, business days are the usual working days: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. The weekend is Saturday and Sunday where many businesses are closed.

Canadian businesses, schools and services have set office hours. The typical office hours are Monday-Friday 9 am to 5 pm but sometimes vary depending on the business. For example, Kingswood campus office hours are 8:00 am to 5:00 pm and Crandall's Office Hours are Monday-Friday 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

It is a good idea to plan ahead and check to see if the business or store you are wanting to go to is open. Usually, a quick Google search is sufficient, however, sometimes it can be helpful to call or email to double check that they will be open before going. This is particularly important during the winter when there are snowstorms as there are times when the weather causes places to close.

In addition, it is normal in Canadian culture to make an appointment if you have a specific person you would like to help you because they may not be available if you walk into the business and ask to see them. This is true at Kingswood and Crandall as well.

Immigration

International Students will be required to obtain a Study Permit, this will provide you the legal right to study in Canada and provide you the opportunity to work legally in Canada. For more information see <https://www.canada.ca/en/immigration-refugees-citizenship/services/study-canada.html>.

Applying for Extensions of Study Permits

Students are required to check and update their immigration documents to ensure their immigration status is maintained. If you need to apply for renewal or extension of status, it is recommended you apply to change your permit at least 30 days before your current permit expires but not earlier than 90 days.

Traveling Outside Canada

When planning to travel outside of Canada it is recommended that you review and ensure none of your documentation will expire while outside of the country. It is also recommended that you have a valid TRV (Temporary Residence Visa) as this is the only document that allows for re-entry to Canada.

Note: Travel outside Canada is not permitted while an immigration document is being processed
